MRC Turns 10!

It was 2004. Dwight Amery was head of a neighborhood group, Maryvale U.N.I.T.E., Claude Mattox was City of Phoenix Councilman, and Jim Miller was Director of Real Estate for John F. Long Properties. Dwight was interested in leaving his current job and working full time to do what he loved best...serving the community and improving Maryvale. The City of Phoenix was considering a \$50 million bond to improve the area. Councilman Mattox and Amery set up a meeting with Miller to discuss setting up a new company to benefit the revitalization of the Maryvale area. With seed money provided by John F. Long Properties, Maryvale Revitalization Corporation (MRC) was born in January 2005.



Over the past ten years, MRC has made more than a dent in the social and physical revitalization of the Maryvale community. We've won WESTMARC's Best of the West Award for Service to Communities (2007) and Top Non-Profit Providing Service to Communities (2010). At least 1,038 homes have been improved, more than 30,000 graffiti sites have been covered and over 10,000 illegal signs have been removed. Since 2010, 644 youth have attended the Think Twice Curfew Diversion class – giving them a chance to understand the reasons behind City curfews. Our

Maryvale Merits Program has been adopted by the City of Phoenix and spread across the city. MRC has made six educational videos and provided both youth and adult leadership training classes.

Volunteer hours weren't tracked before 2010, but in just the past four years, MRC has had over 8,000 volunteers performing over 35,000 hours of service which can be valued at over \$685,000.

MRC is proud to present this Tenth Anniversary edition of our newsletter and celebration of ten years of service to the community.

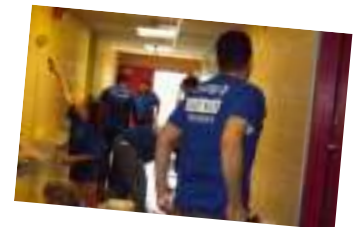


The Captains' Dinners featured several business leaders who volunteered to act as mentors to the attending youth.

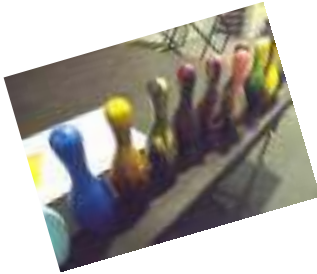

Musicians on display at Ak-Chin Pavilion.

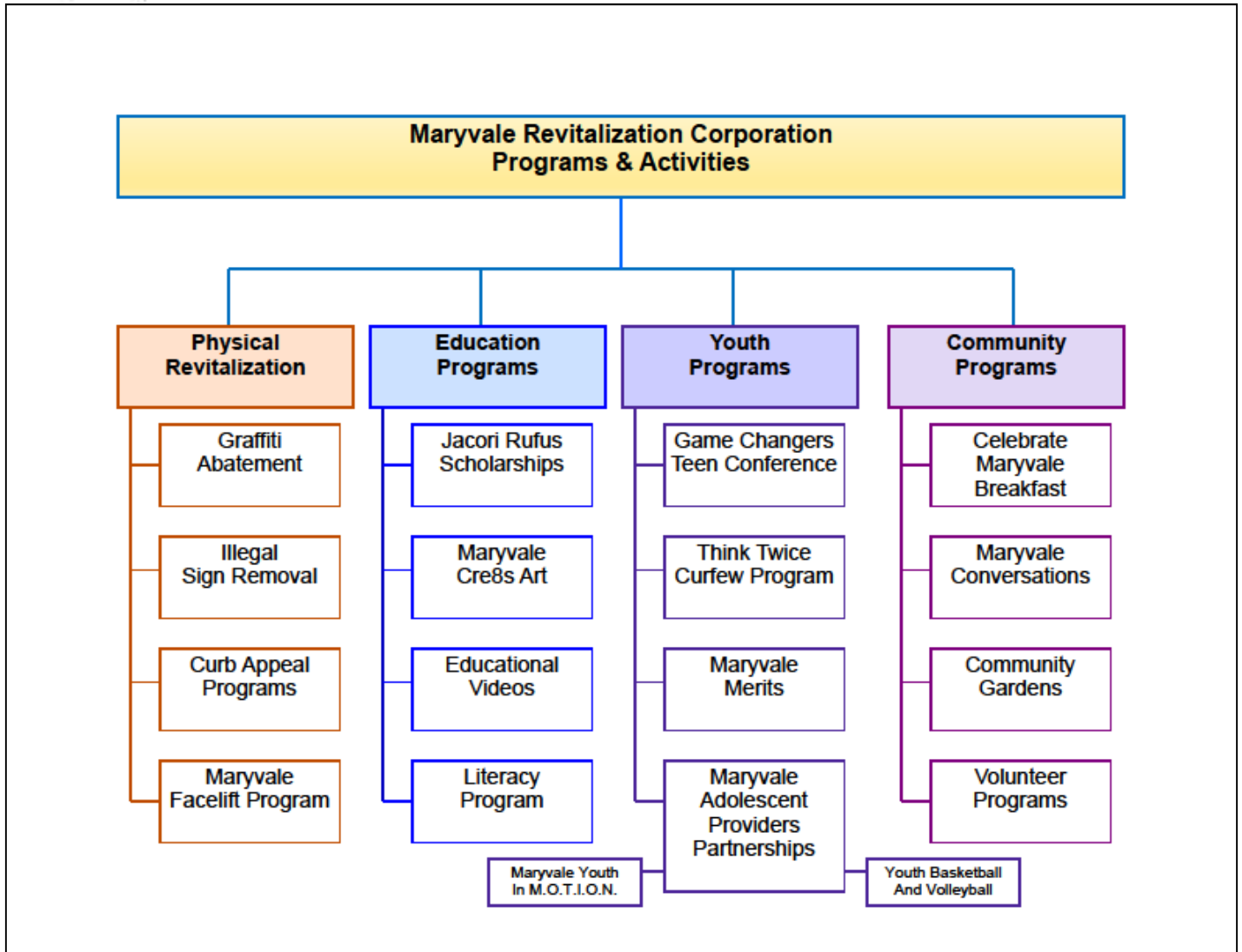
In 2014, MRC kicked off the expansion of our Urban Art Program by renaming it Maryvale Cre8s—starting the year with dozens of youth painting eight life-size musicians. They were displayed at Ak-Chin Pavilion, and over 200,000 concert goers saw the artwork. Tim McGraw even autographed his figure while he was there in concert this year!



Other Cre8s events included painting bowling pins, creating golf ball animals, repairing and remodeling clocks, creating ceramic tile art, painting 55 gallon steel drums as artistic trash cans and cutting some in half as decorated planters. Additionally, tires were painted as planters as were regular planters for our community gardens. Posters were created and provided artwork at Maryvale Hospital and Palo Verde Library, and MRC hosted painting classes at Maryvale Community Center and Desert West Park. 2014 also saw the start of free painting classes for all ages (artists have ranged from 3 to 59) at Hooters West Phoenix.

In order to help raise funds for additional projects, Artwork was sold at the *Celebrate Maryvale!* breakfast and at the Jacori Rufus charity golf tournament. 2015 will see the beginning of youth crafts days. Not only are the participants learning and creating the artwork, but beautifying Maryvale in the process.
